
#### LOST KEYS??

## Summer Sanity—Help your Kids NOT be Bored this Summer!

Keep your Kids rolling in Summer fun with these tried and true ideas. And to keep these activities easy on your budget substitute what you have. If you are missing one of the supplies for an activity or project, think about what you have that could work. you don't have something for the project think about what you can substitute. For example, for box building maybe you don't have any large

boxes, but you could give your child empty pasta or cereal boxes. Maybe you don't have duct tape, but you could use masking tape. The point is to have fun, not spend money, and you may come up with an even better idea.

Don't sweat it. Sometimes your child won't enjoy an activity as much as you expect him to. Don't get frustrated, just try something else and come back to that activity on another day.

•Card Work- Create your own card game. You can make new rules for a card game you have, or create an entirely new game including the cards.

•Create a Collage- Take old magazines and colored paper and create a collage to hang on the wall.

•Cushion-lympics- Pile cushions or pillows on the floor and practice Olympic events like the long jump or wrestling.

•Create a Clubhouse- Start a new club for your friends complete with membership cards, by-laws and a secret hideout.

•Finger Print Fun-Press your fingertips onto a washable ink pad and press them onto a piece of paper. Use a pen to draw body parts and faces on your finger prints to create your own cartoon characters.

•Fort Building- Create a fort using recycled cereal boxes and other found items.

•Get "Buggy"- Use a shoe box to collect bugs from the yard. Collect fireflies in a jar at night.

•<u>Ice Cream in a Bag-</u>Mix 1 tablespoon sugar, ¼ teaspoon vanilla and ½ cup of milk or heavy whipping cream in a quart size zipper bag. Seal the bag tightly. Fill a gallon zipper bag half-full of ice and cover it with 1/3 cup of rock salt. Place the quart bag inside the gallon bag, seal it tightly and shake for about 5 minutes. Enjoy your new frozen concoction!

•Indoor Tents- Cover chairs and tables with a bed sheet to create a tent. Read a stack of books inside your tent.

### July 2014 Edition It's Camping Season ! Here are the Top 10 Ways to make <u>Enemies</u> of your Fellow Campers



1. If you need an extra table at your campsite go ahead and grab one from an empty site. If someone else shows up to camp there, you can always put it back. And if you're not at your site when they pull in, they should be okay without a table for awhile. And if you do borrow one, don't worry about putting it back when you leave. That's the job of the campground manager. They'll gladly figure out where it goes and return it.

2. Go ahead and dump your gray water in the closest convenient spot. There may be posted spots for disposal of waste water, but as long as the majority of folks use them, it won't really matter if you don't.

3. If you carry in trash, just bag it up and leave it at the site. If the managers are doing a good job, they should dispose of it before the wild animals get into it.

4. Don't worry too much about "quiet time." Most campgrounds designate certain hours (usually after 10 p.m.) where only quiet campfire conversation is appropriate. However, the majority of campers really won't care if you want to start up a midnight Frisbee match. You're all there to have fun, right? And besides, if you go into your tent when the conversation gets lively, the sound will be contained by the tent walls.

5. Don't feel obliged to keep your dog on a leash, especially if it's well-trained. People are camping to enjoy the great outdoors, and animals are a part of that. Your dog's presence will just enhance their experience. A few people might be afraid of unleashed dogs, but the likelihood of you running into one is extremely rare.

6. One of the perks of camping is that you don't need to worry about cleaning up after your pet when he does his business, like you would in town. It's all natural. That's the beauty of enjoying the wilderness!

7. If you have friends who will be joining you and you need to let them know where your site is, make up some signs and nail or wire them to trees to point the way. Some people frown on putting nails into live trees, but it's really not a big deal.

8. Go ahead and cut through other people's campsites if you're in a hurry to get to the restroom, playground, or water. It's not like the campsite is their home or anything.

9. You don't need to clean out your fire pit before you leave. The camp managers will probably have time to get to it before the next campers arrive.

10. Similarly, you don't need to clean up your site before heading home. That is what the fee you paid to camp there is for. The whole idea of leaving the place nicer than you found it is just fine. Please be courteous to your fellow campers and NOT follow these rules this season!
